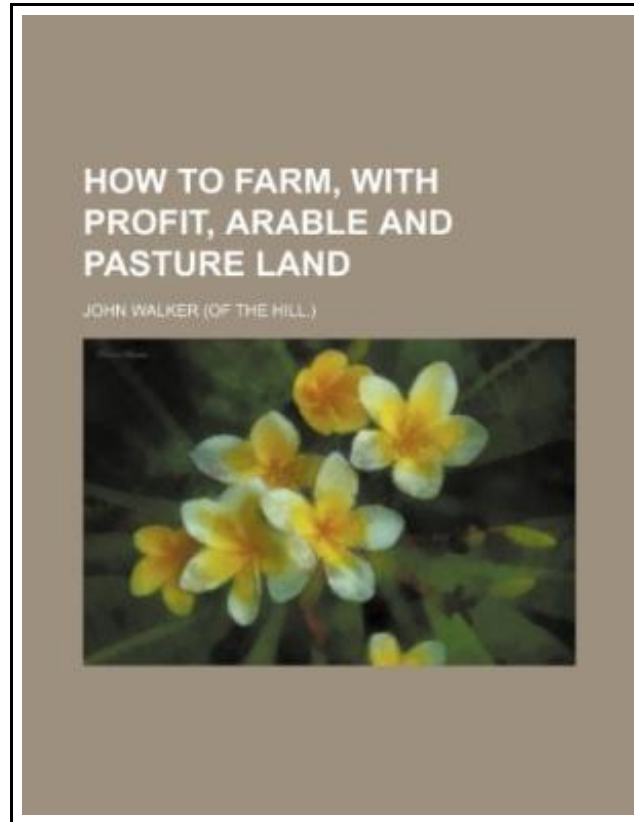

In the warm settled weather of Midsummer I would advocate their not being penned in coops at all. A good hen will find them shady places and more variety of food. At about two months old, the young will leave their mother, and be pretty well able to look after themselves. A little corn may be thrown them morning and evening, if no harvest work or threshing is going on. After first leaving their parent, they should be watched to see that they fly up to roost out of the way of vermin. The roosting sticks should be about four inches in circumference, so as to be easily grasped with the feet. Soon after the first...
